This magnificent organ is the third instrument to serve this church. The first was an 1877 Steere & Turner, Opus 119 of one manual and eight ranks. This served in this building until 1886. The Johnson organ was then installed, which in 1929 was rebuilt and upgraded by Casavant, retaining thirty ranks from the Johnson. The organ was given as a memorial to William Laird by daughters Mrs. Maude Prentiss and Mrs. Francis Bell.
